She is still learning, and everyday is a learning experience. **L** ong time Sno-Burner Bea Toliver from Huntington, Long Island has been the area 's NAACP Youth



Director for quite a few years. Her community contributions in this position has meant a lot of hours spent with the youth in developing and executing programs for them and making the overall community know that their youth are positive civic, cultural and educational role models. Besides long hours of advisement,

Bea has been able to include her husband on many trips to serve as chaperones and provide personal funds to youth who don't have the means to participate. For her efforts her youth have won local and district NAACP Talent Shows known as ACT-SO. From there, the youth have participated at the Annual NAACP Conventions held all over the United States. Her youth have won national honors, money awards and scholarships in the arts, music, science and oratorical presentations.

#### **RETIRING NATIONAL PRESIDENT**



A fter twenty-one years as national president of Immanuel Lutheran College (Greensboro, NC) Alumni Association, Doris Bailey-Reavis is stepping down from that position. Under her leadership, Doris has seen the alumni grow in member-

ship and provide annual cash donations to the local Lutheran Church in Greensboro. It has also provided scholarships to local youth in Greensboro. When integration occurred in the 1960's, and the location of A &T College and Bennett College next door, Immanuel Lutheran College was forced to close its doors. A & T College soon became a university and purchased the land to expand its campus. The association with its local graduates and persistent interaction with A & T University officials was able to have dedication ceremonies and place a monument on the A &T campus last fall, where Immanuel Lutheran College's Administration Building once stood.

After retiring from her administrative assistant position with Southern Westchester BOCES, Doris became more active in her church; became president of the local NAACP; board member of Port Chester Carver Center, Human Development Services, Council of Community Services, and a member of the League of Women Voters, NYNEX Community Advisory Board, Westchester County District Attorney's Community Relations Committee; secretary for the Sno-Burners; and treasurer of a newly formed African American committee concerned about their local presence.

**I** n the fall of 2003 Traci joined the JTL Intermediate School indoor competing Color guard, members of the World Guard International. During the competing season the guard won several chapter competitions in Pennsylvania and New Jersey. The guard consisted of 28 girls and 3 boys who performed dance movements while spinning rifles, flags and sabers to music in a 4 minute routine called "New Era." By the end of the competing season the guard had won the 2004 TIA Chapter 2 Championships and placed  $3^{rd}$  in the Tournament Indoor Championships in Wildwood.



The next year the middle school guard was cancelled and Traci, only an eighth grader, was

moved up to the high school guard who were in Scholastic A class in the fall of 2004. The guard consisted of 18 girls and 2 boys in the show called "Three Babies" by Sinead O' Connor. The guard traveled throughout Pennsylvania and New Jersey, and also went to Syracuse, NY, Boston, Massachusetts, Tampa, Florida and most importantly, Dayton, Ohio. They were WGI South Brunswick Regional Scholastic A Champions, WGI Northeast Power Regional Scholastic A Champions, WGI Tampa Regional Scholastic A Silver Medalists, WGI Boston Regional Scholastic A Finalists, MAIN Scholastic A Champions, TIA Chapter 2 Scholastic Open Champions, and WGI World Championships Scholastic A Bronze Medalists. Also on May 23, 2005 the guard was asked to perform at the Pennsylvania Capitol, an invitation from Representative Mario Scavello.

In 2005-06 our Scholastic Open the team consisted of 22 girls and 3 boys in a show called "Adagio for Leaves." The team was WGI Mid-Atlantic Power Regional Scholastic Open Finalists, WGI Tampa Power Regional Scholastic Open Champions, MAIN Scholastic Open Champions, TIA All Chapter Championships Scholastic Open Champions, and WGI World Championships Scholastic Open Finalists. The team was then promoted to Scholastic World.
